- Begonias popular for their dramatic and beautiful blooms, the underground stem can cause serious irritation of the mouth for both dogs and cats.
- Buttercups beware of skipping through the meadow with your furry friend in tow. Snacking on these flowers can cause stomach upset.
- 6 Crocus watch out for the spring crocus in particular as it can cause gastrointestinal issues for cats



It's not just plants and flowers that can cause an issue, it is also important to be mindful of fertilizers – especially organic varieties. These fertilizers often contain bone, blood or feather meal and the smell can be especially alluring to your pup. But beware - ingesting large quantities can obstruct a dog's stomach.
